Row X Row - The Great Outdoors

I hope you enjoy creating this project, using whatever fabrics and color combinations bring you joy! This pattern is for the quilt setting instructions. Northcott has created four different colorways (Mountain, Desert, Meadow, and Ocean) for this event. Below, you will find fabric requirements for each of these variations. The rows you collect can be set into this quilt either vertically or horizontally.

Fabric Requirements

Depending on where you live in the country, you may decide to make your quilt in a way that represents your geographic region. To make that a bit easier, I've provided the fabric requirements for each of the four colorways, along with the SKUs, and quantities to make ordering the fabric you need easier.

Good To Know

Read - all the way through the instructions very carefully, skipping steps may cause you problems at future stages in your project.

Choosing fabrics - I use 100% cotton fabrics for this pattern, pre-wash and then press (I love to use <u>Best Press</u>) all fabrics before I work with them. Doing so makes the fabrics so much easier to work with and my cutting more accurate.

- Fabric washing tip: I use a long basting stitch on my machine to fold over and stitch the raw / cut edges on my fabrics before I wash them in the machine. This helps to nearly eliminate raveling and it's easy to remove the basting after the fabrics are washed and dried.
- Pressing after washing is also very important I always use a light spray of Best Press to restore a little of the body and make the fabrics easier to handle before I cut into them.
- If I am at all worried about fabric bleeding I also use <u>Color Catcher</u> sheets in the wash (or wash fabrics with white vinegar) before using in a finished project. They are available in the laundry section of most any grocery store.
- Some colors (like red, navy blue or black) are more prone to bleeding and I want to know that - and eliminate the problem, before my project is complete.
 Wash them until there is no further sign of bleeding your fabrics could need multiple washes to eliminate the excess dye.

Sewing - Use an accurate 1/4" seam (unless otherwise specified). A 1/4" foot for your machine is a great investment.

Pressing - Press seams at each step before moving on to the next step. Normally I press seams to the darker fabric but sometimes it's important to press a seam in a specific direction. If that's the case - I will let you know at that step.

Thread - use a good quality thread (I like 100% 40wt or 50wt cotton) for both piecing and quilting in most projects.

Needle - The beginning of any project is a great time to change the needle in your sewing machine.

Clean the lint and fibers out of your machine. Remove the throat plate and the bobbin case and use a tiny brush or a pipe cleaner to get all the remnants of past projects out of the way before you start this new project. Never used compressed air to blow out the lint and fibers - it will just push them further up into your machine where you can't easily get them out. Your machine will run more smoothly and you'll spend less time trouble shooting problems.

Fusible Applique: I <u>ALWAYS</u> place a teflon sheet or piece of parchment on my ironing surface - and another between my iron and the fabrics I am fusing. This keeps the fusible glue away from the surface of my iron (and the ironing surface). I can still see through them to confirm that my placement is correct.

Cutting Instructions

Directional Rows: This pattern is designed in such a way that you can set your rows either vertically or horizontally so they "read" correctly in the finished quilt.





The fabrics are also directional. You will want the fabrics to appear in a normal orientation. That means you will need to cut the (right / left) side panels for the vertical rows across the design of the fabric. The horizontal rows will have the row side panels (top and bottom) cut "with" the direction of the fabric design.

Fabric	How Many / What Size / Where Used
Outer Border - Sky	 Cut [3] 5-1/2 inch x 25-1/2 strips (Outer Top Border). Cut [2] 13-1/4 inch x 5-1/2 inch strips (Outer Side Borders / Top)
Outer Border - Ground	 Cut [3] 5-1/2 inch x 25-1/2 strips (Outer Bottom Border). Cut [2] 13-1/4 inch x 5-1/2 inch strips (Outer Side Borders / Bottom)
Outer Border - Sides	 Cut [2] 5-1/2 inches x WOF strips. Subcut to 5-1/2 inches x 38-1/2 inches (Outer Side Borders / Middle)
Row Borders	 Vertical: Cut [8] 18-1/2 inches x 5 inches. Horizontal: Cut [10] 5 Inches x 18-1/2 inches. Note: If your rows are all horizontal (or all vertical), cut your row borders so that the directional lines of the fabric are horizontal to the top and bottom of the completed quilt.
Sashing	 Vertical: Cut [12] 3-1/2 inch x 18-1/2 inch strips Horizontal: Cut [12] 3-1/2 inch x 18-1/2 inch strips Cornerstones: Cut [16] 3-1/2 inch square cornerstones. Note: Mountain and Ocean colorways use a contrasting cornerstone.
Binding	 Cut [9] strips 2-1/2 inches x WOF. Join those strips end to end using a diagonal seam. Press.

Block Assembly

1. Vertical Rows:

- **a. Arrange** and sew a 5-inch x 18-1/2 inch row border strip to each side of your completed row. Press.
- **b.** The finished blocks should measure 18-1/2 inches square.

2. Horizontal Rows:


- a. Arrange and sew an 18-1/2 inch x 5-inch row border strip to the top and bottom of your completed row. Press.
- **b.** The finished blocks should measure 18-1/2 inches square.






Quilt Assembly:

- 1. Arrange and sew the blocks and sashing strips into rows:
 - a. Rows 1, 3, 5, and 7: Cornerstone / Sashing Strip / Cornerstone / Sashing Strip / Cornerstone / Sashing Strip / Cornerstone
 - b. Rows 2 and 6: Sashing strip / Vertical Row Block / Sashing Strip / Horizontal Row Block / Sashing Strip / Vertical Row Block / Sashing Strip
 - c. Row 4: Sashing Strip / Horizontal Block Row / Sashing Strip / Vertical Block Row / Sashing Strip / Horizontal Block Row / Sashing Strip
- 2. Arrange and sew the rows together in order (1 7). Press.
 - **a.** The completed quilt center should measure 64 inches square.



Borders:

- 1. Border Assembly (border strips will need to be pieced):
 - a. Outer Border (Top):
 - Arrange and sew the [3] 5-1/2 inch x 21-78" (Sky) strips together end to end. Press. The border strip should measure 5-1/2 inches x 64 inches.
 - Arrange and sew the 5-1/2 inch x 64-inch (Sky) border strip to the top of the assembled quilt top.
 - b. Outer Border (Bottom):
 - Arrange and sew the [3] 5-1/2 inch x 21-78" (Ground) strips together end to end. Press. The border strip should measure 5-1/2 inches x 64 inches.
 - Arrange and sew the 5-1/2 inch x 64-inch (Ground) border strip to the bottom of the assembled quilt top.
 - c. Outer Border (Sides):
 - Arrange and sew the side borders, Sky / Panel Strip / Ground strips end to
 - end. Press. Make [2]. The completed side borders should measure 5-1/2 inches x 75 inches
 - Arrange and sew these border strips to the right and left sides of the completed quilt center. Press.
 - d. **Your assembled top** (with borders) should measure 75 inches x 75 inches.



Finishing:

- Layer the assembled top on the backing and batting. Baste all three layers together.
- 2. Quilt and Bind as desired.
- 3. Attach a rod pocket to the back for hanging (optional).
